## Day of Action

## Kenosha County Youth As Resources (YAR)



Kenosha County Youth As Resources (YAR) is a grant-giving program which funds youth-designed, youth-led community service projects in Kenosha County. Youth, with guidance from adults, determine the project they believe will address a need in their community. Youth groups may apply to Kenosha County YAR for grants of up to \$500.

YAR is a program of United Way of Kenosha County in partnership with Kenosha County University of Wisconsin-Extension.

2015-2016 YAR results:

- 15 grants funded
- \$4,550 distributed
- 1,420 youth participants

2005-2016 YAR results:

- 141 grants funded
- \$50,800 distributed
- 5,809 youth participants



## McKinley Elementary Tutoring Program

The McKinley Tutoring Program is an Early Grade Reading Initiative that helps children build the critical reading skills needed to succeed in school and life.

Research shows that third grade reading proficiency is a powerful predictor of later academic achievement. From kindergarten to third grade, children learn to read. From fourth grade on, they read to learn.

A student who is not at least moderately successful in reading by third grade is unlikely to graduate from high school.

Through this tutoring program, we recruit, train and place community volunteers in the schools. The tutors work one-on-one with first through third grade students during the school day to supplement the work they are doing in the classroom.

- 74 tutors
- 57 students
- Students in the program collectively went up 150 reading levels in one school year!

# FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE

## VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE (VITA) PROGRAM

In an effort to promote financial stability and asset building in our community, the Kenosha Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Coalition (United Way of Kenosha County, the Kenosha County Job Center, Gateway Technical College and Carthage College) together with IRS-certified volunteers are providing free income tax assistance to low-to-moderate-income families.

The average income of Kenosha's VITA clients is approximately \$15,000 per year. To many, VITA helps obtain tax credits that may add up to a month's worth of salary to the individual or family's annual income.

"The VITA Program creates a link between Carthage College Students and the Kenosha Community. The students provide a great resource to the community while developing their technical knowledge and interpersonal skills. Beyond these skills, the students gain an awareness and empathy for our clients that come from all walks of life.

When Carthage first participated in VITA in 1993, we prepared returns by hand and were able to help around 50 clients each season. Through United Way's support and guidance, the program has grown to 38 Carthage students and 67 additional community volunteers helping to prepare more than 3,750 state and federal returns annually."

## THE RESULTS

- 105 individuals participated as certified tax preparers
- Volunteers logged 2,977 hours
- 3,157 returns were filed
- 1,686 taxpayers were assisted
- Kenosha residents saved \$418,465 in tax processing fees
- \$2,393,193 in total refunds received through the Kenosha County VITA program
- The Kenosha VITA program has brought back more than \$11.1 million in refunds during the past seven years





# IS HAPPINESS.

## MyFreeTaxes

For the past three years, United Way of Kenosha County has been promoting the use of MyFreeTaxes.com - a FREE, safe and secure site for households earning less than \$64,000 to file their state and federal tax returns.

Today, more than 1,800 people use MyFreeTaxes.com in Wisconsin, including 190 people right here in Kenosha County. Residents of Kenosha currently receive an average refund of \$1,600.

# HE WHO HAS HEALTH, HAS HOPE;

## FamilyWize Prescription Discount Program

Nearly 1,000 United Ways partner with FamilyWize in all 50 states to lower the cost of medicine by distributing free FamilyWize prescription drug discount cards. These free discount cards are for all individuals across the country.

Card users ALWAYS get the lowest price. The cost will be the discount price with the FamilyWize card or the pharmacy's usual and customary retail price, whichever is lower.

### How the Card Works

- Average savings: 35 percent, about \$20 per prescription
- Anyone can use it: employees, family or friends
- No registration, activation or paperwork necessary
- Accepted at 60,000 pharmacies nationally and 28 in Kenosha County
- Covers all FDA-approved drugs
- No cost to United Way, employers or card holders



**Since the program began in 2007, Kenosha County has recognized \$1,505,639 in savings and has helped more than 13,000 community members!**

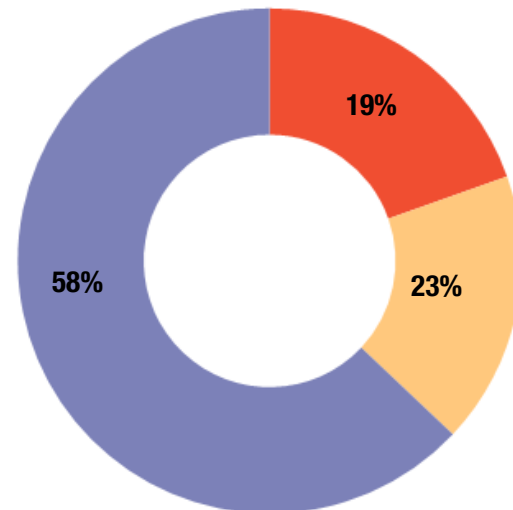
